






DO YOU HAVE QUESTIONS ABOUT RECYCLING AT TULANE?


You aren't the only one-we promise! Recycling can sometimes be confusing because Tulane students come from all over the country, and different cities have different recycling policies. This presentation will hopefully clarify any confusion or misconceptions that you might have about recycling on Tulane's Uptown campus.





Short Answer: YES!

Long Answer: All paper products, including white paper, colored paper, newspaper, magazines, folders and paperboard can be recycled on Tulane's campus. Anything from old class notes to last month's edition of Vogue can be recycled easily!



Long Answer: PJ's pa cups can't be recycle because they are wa coated on the inside keep your coffee/tea from soaking throug paper. The same thin applies to wax-coate


juice cartons, juice b



SIDE NOTE: CAN PAPER PJ'S CUPS BE RECYCLED?

Short Answer: Sadly, No.

Long Answer: PJ's paper cups can't be recycled because they are wax-coated on the inside to keep your coffee/tea from soaking through the paper. The same thing applies to wax-coated juice cartons, juice boxes, and other similar things.





GAN CARDBOARD BE

RECYCLED?

Short Answer: YES!

Long Answer: Cardboard can (and should) be recycled! Cardboard boxes, such as the ones you get mail in, should be emptied and placed in your dorm's recycling room or, in the case of outdoor recycling, by the dumpsters. The boxes will then be collected by Facility Services and recycled.





SIDE NOTE: CAN PIZZA BOXES BE RECYCLED?

This question is a little bit trickier to answerpizza boxes are often very greasy and have leftover food on them, which can ruin a batch of
recycled materials. If you want to recycle your
pizza box, tear off the non-greasy part and place
it where you would normally place cardboard. The
greasy part MUST be thrown away.






CAN PLASTIC BE RECYCLED?

Short Answer: It depends.

Long Answer: The ability to recycle plastic depends what the "number" the plastic is. On Tulane's Uptown campus, we only have the ability to recycle plastics #1 and #2. This number can almost always be found on the bottom of the plastic object. Check before tossing it into a recycling bin!







what do #1 and #2 really mean?

Tulane's Uptown Campus has the ability to recycle Plastics #1 and #2, which are the most commonly used plastics.

Plastic #1: PET
(Polyethylene Terephthalate)
-often found in products
such as water bottles and
packaging.
-when recycled, it is either
turned back into more PET
plastic or spun into
polyester fiber, used to
make textiles like clothing
or carpets.

Plastic #2: HDPE (High-Density
Polyethylene)
—this is the thick plastic used to
make items like milk jugs, children's
toys, and detergent bottles.
—considered the safest and most
recyclable form of plastic
—when recycled, HDPE plastic is often
turned into durable products like
park benches, picnic tables, and
plastic lumber.



Side note: is there food on/in the plastic?

Lots of dorm room-friendly snack foods like Nutella and peanut butter come in plastic containers. But can you recycle the jars? Of course you can, but only if you rinse it thoroughly first. It is important to know that FOOD IS A CONTAMINANT. Food found in a "batch" of recyclables can render the entire batch un-reycleable.





CAN GLASS BE RECYCLED?

Short Answer: Sadly, no.

Long Answer: New Orleans, and therefore Tulane, cannot recycle glass. To reduce waste from glass, consider avoiding the purchase of items and foods that come in glass containers.



Side Note: Glass can be recycled almost everywhere else, so please continue to recycle glass while at home on school breaks.



CAN ALUMINUM BE RECYCLED? Short Answer: YES!

Long Answer: Yes, aluminum cans can be recycled on Tulane's campus. They should be rinsed out and placed in the bottle and can recycling bins with plastic recyclables. Tin cans, like the cans that soup or canned vegetables come in, can also be recycled!
